





The EQUATOR Network was officially launched in June 2008. Since its launch, the programme has already achieved important milestones:

- Developed a free online Library for health research reporting (http://www.equator-network.org/) that has been widely accessed by people from all over the world
- In collaboration with the Pan American Health Organisation (PAHO) launched the **Spanish** version of the EOUATOR website and promoting responsible research reporting in **South American** and Caribbean regions (http://www.espanol.eguatornetwork.org/)



- Built international recognition and reputation as the leading authority and resource portal in the area of health research reporting. Reference to EQUATOR is included in the "Recommendations for the Conduct, Reporting, Editing, and Publication of Scholarly Work in Medical Journals' (formerly Uniform Requirements for Biomedical Manuscripts), the most fundamental guidelines developed by the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (ICMJE) that are followed by most biomedical journals
- Organised numerous workshops, seminars, talks and Annual Lectures on issues relevant to research reporting
- Published a number of research papers and articles promoting good research reporting; published a regular online newsletter and set up a LinkedIn group and social media presence disseminating information about new reporting guidelines and the latest developments
